- We will provide our staff, learners and families with the support, training and tools needed to adapt to an ever-evolving educational environment.
- We will be transparent, timely and accurate in all communications.
- In pivoting to respond to the unpredictable future, we will remain firmly grounded in our District mission, vision and beliefs.

The following flow-chart provides various options for district consideration in consultation with local health officials and stakeholders. The chart is intended to provide a flexible framework for addressing challenges that may arise throughout the 2020-2021 school year, while ensuring the continued success and safety of our learners and employees. Working in consultation with the Southeastern Idaho Public Health Department, we have established Tuesday, August 11 as the deadline to announce our final decision regarding which instructional model we will use to start the school year:

As of Tuesday, July 30, 2020 our community is in Category 1. The decision to transition between Categories 1, 2, and 3 will be made in conjunction with state and/or local health agencies following the Governor's Rebound Idaho plan and <u>Southeastern Idaho Public Health's (SIPH) COVID-19 Regional Response Plan.</u> PCSD 25 will link to SIPH's Covid-19 Regional Response Plan as soon as the document is approved by SIPH. Provide hand soap and hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol, paper towels, and no-touch trash cans in all bathrooms, classrooms, and frequently trafficked areas.
